Hoping to see many of you on the trail this winter!

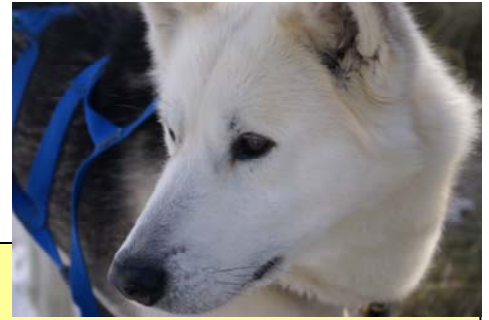
